Throughout this journey, you've supported your child by building routines, encouraging effort, and celebrating small wins. But one of the most powerful ways children learn is by watching you.

Every moment spent playing, exploring, and talking together is a chance to pass on values that matter most to you. Take time to share these with your child, and show them through your everyday actions.

INTEGRITY

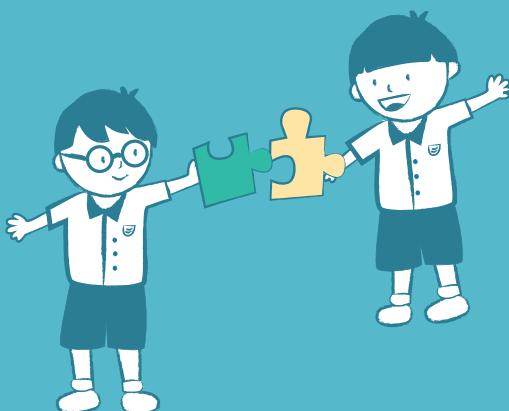

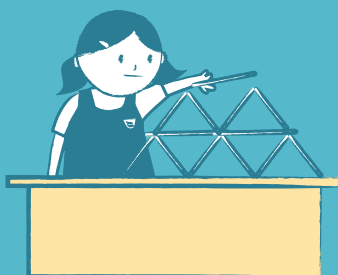
RESPECT

Hmmm... What should I do if...

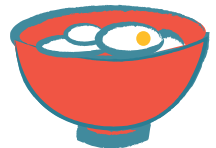
Someone walking in front of you drops \$10 on the ground.



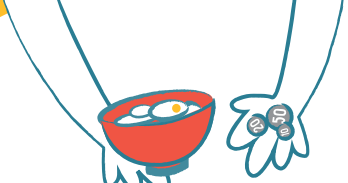
Your friend asks to see your answers during a quiz in class.

A classmate has forgotten to bring his or her pencil case.

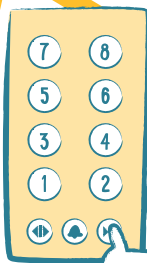
At recess, your friend finished his food and left the plastic wrapper on the table.



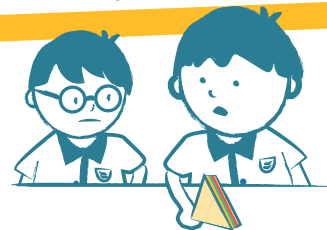
You're doing your work in class and find it quite tough. Your friend isn't able to help you.
